






Could you identify elements of ethos (credibility appeal) in the story?

Speaker seemed trustworthy and stated facts.


Elements of relationships to the murder victim

Images were included for visual reference.


Emotional appeal with potential motives

Murder mysteries can be tangentially skewed. From a rhetorical perspective, logos is often the most difficult in something that isn't inherently factually based. This piece came across like it was though, and that made it logical.

The entire module was very logically thought out, especially when giving the motives of each suspect.


Options for deciding to help or not based on relationship to the victim

Also within the motives but also the different selections to choose from


Having to pick which character based on the evidence provided was logos. I think.

I view storytelling as a form of meaningful communication




I could tell this story was created by Clara




I was emotionally drawn to the story




A key moment in the story compelled me to think about my experiences




The use of visuals was effective in conveying the story




The use of audio was effective in conveying the story







Which ending did you end up with? Ex: 2 B Periwinkle




Which ending did you end up with? Ex: 2 B Periwinkle
